Worthen works to hold corporations accountable

Dick Worthen, long-time political activist and Piasa Palisades Group member, will speak on “corporate accountability” at the April meeting.

At first thought, the topic may not seem to fit in with traditional environmental issues such as wilderness protection, endangered species, clean air and clean water, but they are closely related.

The presentation will be a perfect follow-up to the group’s energy film series, which included movies on global warming, the electric car, genetic food manipulation and drilling for oil in Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Did you know that within the lifetime of older people

you knew:

1) Corporations could not legally give money to politicians, own other corporations, live forever, claim the rights of living people or accumulate unlimited power or money?

2) Corporations were required to pay taxes and obey the law, owners were jointly and severally accountable for all corporate debts, and corporations could not declare bankruptcy?

“Our world would be considerably different if we had the laws that our grandparents had,” Worthen said.

Worthen is a former Madison County Board member and former Madison County stormwater coordinator. He has served on the Illinois River Coordinating Council and other boards and committees. He lives in Alton.

“I have been speaking, organizing, battling in politics, fighting in the regulatory system and working and witnessing for sane environmental (policies) for many years,” he said.

At times, the situation seemed hopeless. But Worthen found a renewed sense of purpose and determination in 2005, when he became a member of the national Sierra Club’s Corporate Accountability Committee.

“It seems that everything in my

life has been in preparation for this work in corporate accountability,” he said. “This is a battle worth fighting, and there is hope and light at the end of the path.”

The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 9, at the First Unitarian Church at Third and Alby streets in Alton. The talk will be followed by refreshments and discussion.

Lovins to speak at energy conference

The Piasa Palisades Group will co-sponsor the second-annual Clean Energy Conference April 5-6 with three presentations by Hunter Lovins. She is an expert on sustainable development, co-founder of the Colorado-based organization Natural Capitalism, co-author of nine books, a professor, corporate consultant and trained lawyer.

Lovins will speak on "The Business Case for Protecting the Climate" at 10 a.m. Thursday at Gargoyle Auditorium in Mallinckrodt Student Center at Washington University in St. Louis, 7:30 p.m. Thursday in Wanamaker Hall at Principia College in Elsah and 1 p.m. Friday in the Meridian Ballroom of Morris University Center at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.

After Thursday morning's presentation, a panel discussion on "Greening Our Lives for the Future" will be held from 11:30 a.m. to 1

p.m. at Washington University. A Sierra Club representative will join university officials to raise awareness of what's being done on local college campuses to reduce and modify energy use.
