Shawnee field rep to speak

Terri Treacy, a Sierra Club field representative working in the trenches of Southern Illinois, will be the guest speaker at the March meeting of the Piasa Palisades Group.

She'll focus on the club's renewed campaign to protect three sites in Shawnee National Forest as federal wilderness areas: Camp Hutchins, Ripple Hollow and Burke Branch.

She'll also outline a plan of action and offer suggestions on how metro-east residents can help.

"Wilderness protection is a strategic process that requires a collective and coordinated contribution of work and spirit," said Treacy, who's based in Golconda.
